


# KNOW YOUR BUS SERVICE



The route from Blanca Loop to Marpole can be described as one of the scenic trips around Vancouver.

Between Blanca and Trimble on Fourth Avenue, bus passengers have a sweeping view of English Bay including all of West Vancouver, the North Shore Mountains, Stanley Park and the West End of the city. As buses cross Granville Street Bridge, there is a panoramic view of downtown and the interesting industrial area of False Creek to the south, and out into English Bay to the North.

From Blanca Loop (which is also the terminus of the University Service (43 - 44) ) 17 - Oak travels north on Blanca to Fourth, then to Granville Street, across Granville Bridge, north on Seymour to Hastings, east to Cambie, across Cambie Bridge to Broadway; west to Oak Street, and then to Marine Drive and the Marpole Loop.

Returning as 4 Fourth, it follows a reverse route except through the downtown area where it leaves Cambie Bridge for Robson Street, turns north on to Pender Street, west to Howe, and from there to Granville Street Bridge.


In addition to providing scenic views of the city's centre, this route serves the Vancouver General Hospital, Shaughnessy Hospital, Pearson T.B. Hospital, the King Edward Continuing Education Centre, Vancouver Vocational Institute, Vancouver School of Art, and Jericho Hill School as well as several important community centres. It also carries thousands of U.B.C. students to and from Blanca Loop.

**42 - Spanish Banks** - This route connects with 4 - 17 at Alma. From Broadway, it travels via Alma to Fourth Avenue, to Discovery, to N.W. Marine, to Trimble, to Hadden, to N.W. Marine and to Spanish Banks Loop, and returns by the same route. It serves the Spanish Banks area, and is popular in the summer with the thousands of people who enjoy the westerly beaches with their great stretches of sand at low tides.


