**Minor change
on two routes**

A minor route change has been made affecting two bus services. No. 17 Oak and No. 60 Richmond Express now travel north across Granville Bridge to Davie Street, then turn east for one block on Davie, and north on Seymour. (Formerly they left the bridge by the Seymour Street ramp.)

In conjunction with this change, the present bus stop on Davie Street immediately east of Granville Street will no longer be used. Buses will stop on Seymour Street immediately north of Davie.

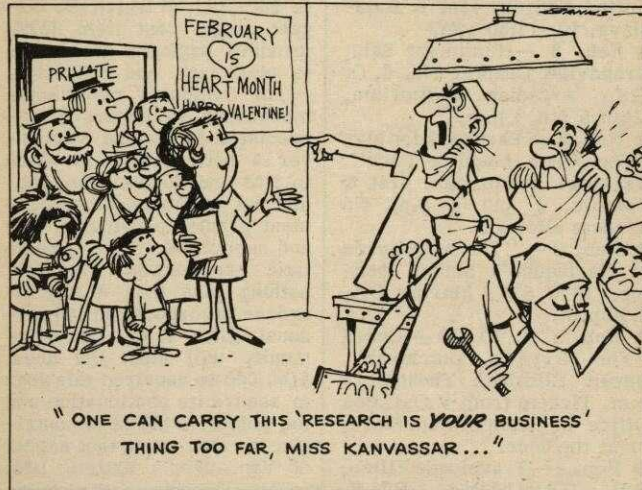
**#3-MAIN BUS

'HEART MONTH'

February is "Heart Month" throughout North America. In British Columbia, the 1968 campaign target is \$335,000.

This year's theme is "Research is YOUR business". In 1967 the B.C. Heart Fund spent \$284,507 on research. That this money is well spent is proved by the remarkable and encouraging advances being made in treatment, diagnosis and prevention of heart disease. B.C. also has its own Work Evaluation Unit to help with rehabilitation of heart patients, and a transportation assistance programme which has aided hundreds of patients in the province.

Since last year a new Children's Heart Lab-

Symphony seeks increased support

The largest and most important fund-drive in the 38-year history of the Vancouver Symphony Society has been launched.

Symphony is big business. The current operating budget is \$591,103, of which the largest single cost item (62%) provides payment of salaries to musicians and conductor.

The Symphony contributes more than is generally appreciated in making Vancouver a better place in which to live and do business. Substantial advances in government grants (provincial, city and municipal) appear a realistic expectation. Even so, nothing less than a 30% increase in corporation and personal gifts from the community will meet the need. \$165,000 is required this year to assure its continuation and the public is asked to contribute to this important aspect of Vancouver's artistic life.
