permanent closure of sections of East Mall and University Boulevard.

The changes in service will chiefly benefit university students, staff and visitors, but will not affect passengers on the regular 10th-Hastings section of the route. West-bound buses will continue to stop at Blanca Loop but east-bound buses will stop at a new eastbound stop on 10th at Blanca instead of using Blanca Loop.

Buses from Kootenay Loop will carry the sign "10 Tenth-UBC via Blvd.". Some buses will be routed via Chancellor Blvd. and will show "10 Tenth-UBC via Chanc.". Trolley coaches terminating at Blanca Loop will show "10 Tenth".

Buses leaving the University terminal will show "14 Hastings" or "45 UBC Express" in the case of express buses.

New timetables are being printed.

RICHMOND and NEW AIRPORT

Routes on Sea Island will be changed on August 2 in preparation for introduction of a new route to serve the new airport terminal when it opens in September. The existing Airport service will be called "70 Sea Island". The present Miller Road service will be called "72 Grauer" and will no longer operate to Aylmer and Miller. The service to the new terminal will be called "71 Airport" when it commences operation in September.

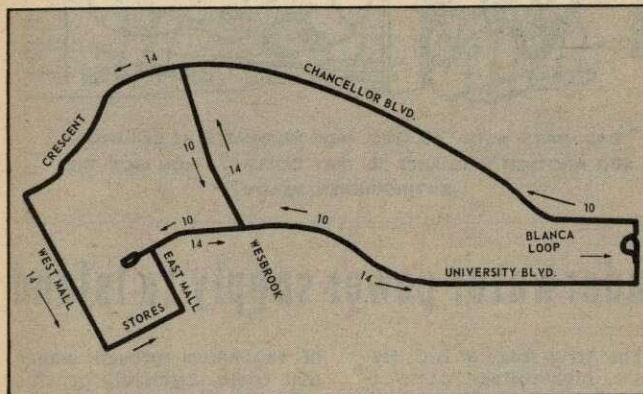


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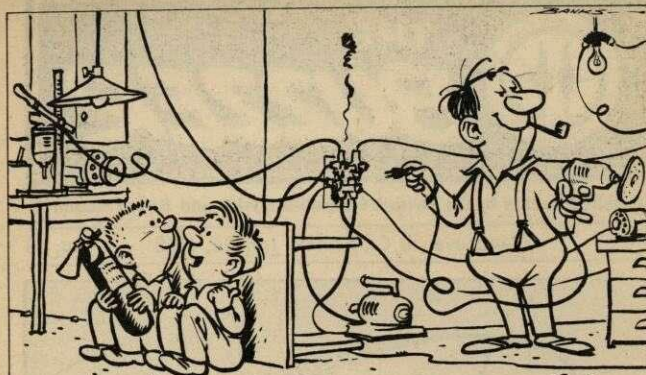

Route changes for 10 Tenth - UBC and Richmond

Starting Friday, August 2, all buses operating on 10th Avenue will continue through to the University of British Columbia. The 10th-UBC service will be joined with the Hastings service and will be operated with buses because there are no trolley wires in the University District. However, trolley buses will be used in the morning rush-hour period between Blanca and Kootenay Loop to supplement the service.

For the benefit of students, the University is building a new transit terminus on University Boulevard immediately west of the East Mall. Buses will proceed from 10th Avenue to this terminus and will then operate on a revised routing around the University because of the

Underwater power supply to Island

The first stage of B.C. Hydro's high-voltage direct-current interconnection between the Lower Mainland and Vancouver Island was completed over the July 1 weekend. An additional 78,000 kilowatts of electric power became available for Vancouver Island users following tests of the 130,000-volt underwater link.

The Island previously had a total power supply of about 590,000 kilowatts. This included about 350,000 kilowatts from its hydro generating plants and two existing alternating current underwater circuits from the Mainland with a total of about 240,000 kilowatts.

Nearly 19 miles of the power supply route from the Mainland lie under water, between Tsawwassen and Galiano Island and between Parker and Salt Spring Islands. The remaining 23 miles are spanned by conventional aerial conductor.

The DC system is capable

of expansion through stages that could ultimately provide a total transmission capacity of 624,000 kilowatts.

The Lower Mainland-Vancouver Island interconnection is the first high-voltage direct current link to be placed in service in the Western Hemisphere. There are only seven or eight projects of this type in the world commissioned or under construction at the present time.

The two existing AC submarine cable circuits between the mainland and Vancouver Island were laid in 1956 and 1958.
