A contract valued at almost \$1.1 million has been awarded to Canron Limited, of Vancouver, for design, supply and delivery of the slender poles.

The line will carry power from Burrard Thermal Generating Plant, on the shore of Burrard Inlet, to the new Meridian 500/230 kv switching station in Coquitlam.

Power from the vast hydroelectric generating plant now under construction at Mica, 85 miles north of Revelstoke. also will flow to the Lower Mainland via Meridian switching station in 1977.

Route of the new line from Burrard to Meridian will generally follow an existing wood pole line. For some two-anda-half miles, through the Anmore area, the line will be open to view and strung on the new-design single steel columns.

From Meridian the new line will continue south to the freeway, roughly parallel to the 500,000-volt Peace River line for part of the way. About five miles of the new line. starting near Dewdney Trunk Road, will be supported by single steel poles.

Terminating near the freeway, the new 230,000-volt line will be tied into an existing circuit to provide additional power for customers in the Lower Mainland area. The poles will vary in height from about 110 feet to 170 feet.

While more costly than

standard steel towers, the slim-lined single steel columns were chosen for part of the new line to improve its appearance. Hydro is experiment ing with their use in sele areas where high visibility lines is a significant factor.

Favorable public reaction was reported when single steel poles of similar design were first introduced in British Columbia in 1973. Hydro installed these along heavilytravelled stretches of freeway in Richmond and Delta.

Construction of the new line is scheduled to start this spring, with completion before the end of the year.

# Words to Aid **Blind Persons**

People who have seriously deficient sight, but who are not totally blind, frequently have difficulty in seeing people seated in a bus. Consequently they may attempt to sit down in a seat already occupi Believe it or not, the pe in the seat usually says nothing with the result that both he or she and the blind person are embarrassed. The solution of course is to say something before you are sat on, even of a squeak of surprise is the best you can do.

Also, speaking of blind people, they usually are able to board a bus without help. However, they cannot identify the bus they want at a stop used by more than one route. Consequently they would appreciate being advised by someone at the stop which bus is approaching.
