

New Transit Routes

Commencing Tuesday, September 2, seven local routes will begin service in the Surrey, Delta and White Rock areas. They will operate out of the Surrey Transit Centre.


For the present, Stage 1, there will be no service during evenings and on Sundays and holidays except 316 116th Street which will operate seven days per week. Timetables will be available before the date the services go into operation. In October, Stage 2 will see the hours of service expanded.

White Rock will have four new routes:

351 North Bluff, 353 Marine Drive, 355 Russell and 356 Cranley.

351 North Bluff — from the White Rock terminus at Johnston and North Bluff to the terminus at Crescent Beach on Beecher at the farside of McBride. Main streets served are

Thrift, Oxford, North Bluff and 128th Street, alternating with service on Ocean Park Drive.

353 Marine — from White Rock terminus to Ocean Park, with major portions of service on Johnston, Pacific, Centre, Columbia, Maple, Marine Drive and 128th Street.

355 Russell — from White Rock terminus via Johnston, Russell, Stayte, Marine Drive and Maple to the terminus at Victoria. From Victoria and Maple, service is via Maple, Columbia, Stayte, Russell, Johnston, Thrift, Foster, and North Bluff to Johnston. A limited service will be provided on Thrift, King George, 164th Street and Campbell River Road.

356 Cranley — from White Rock terminus via Johnston, Pacific, Fir, Buena Vista, Finlay, 24th Avenue and Cranley Drive to Cranley terminus. Then via Cranley, Stayte, North Bluff, Kent, Buena Vista, Fir, Pacific and Johnston to White Rock terminus.

North Surrey will be served locally by 325 140th Street and 328 Grosvenor. Combined, these routes provide service within Surrey from Grosvenor and Gladstone (the north terminus), to 140th Street and 88th Avenue (the south terminus). The two routes serve Surrey Memorial Hospital and Douglas College with transfer connections to the FastBUS system at Whalley Exchange.

Both North Surrey and North Delta are served by 316 116th Street, which links Whalley Exchange in Surrey with Scottsdale Mall in North Delta. The major portions of

'Round the Park Special Bus Service

'Round the Park bus service is now operating around Stanley Park but is subject to cancellation in the event of bad weather. Buses leave the Stanley Park loop every 20 minutes from 10:00 a.m. to 7:00 p.m. Sundays and statutory holidays. No transfers are accepted or issued and no stop-overs are permitted. Fares are 25¢ for adults, 15¢ on presentation of valid certificates, and 10¢ for children. All are cash fares as operators do not carry change. Sunday and Holiday passes are valid and all pensioners passes.

Express Buses Serve B.C.-Winnipeg Game

Take an express bus to and from the football games at Empire Stadium and avoid the hassle of traffic and parking. The fare is only 50¢ each way and the service is fast and comfortable, with buses stopping close to the main entrance of the stadium.

Buses load at Woodward's Oakridge, 41st and Oak, from 6:30 to 7:00 p.m. At Woodward's New Westminster, they load sharp at 6:45 p.m. for the 7:30 p.m. start of the game. Plenty of free parking is available at the centres.

After the game, buses are waiting to return to the shopping centres.
