


# The Suburban System

Effective Friday, April 4, the first stages of a new Suburban Transit System will commence operations. This system will be expanded in Surrey and Delta as equipment, manpower and garage facilities become available.

The eventual network of FastBUSES south of the Fraser River will connect local systems in Surrey and Delta with the Greater Vancouver Transit System. Surrey will have additional new routes commencing May 30, details of which will be announced later.

Eventually, too, local exchanges will be established, similar to Lougheed and Phibbs where local and FastBUS routes will meet for transfer of passengers.

On the same day as the first of the Suburban routes go into operation, a new fare system will take effect to cover the (continued on page 7)

### New Passes only on Suburban Buses

The new \$1.50 Sunday and Holiday Pass, which is good on Metropolitan routes and the new Suburban routes, can be purchased only on Suburban buses. The present 50¢ pass, good only within the Metropolitan system, still will be available. A purchaser of the 50¢ pass who wishes to obtain a \$1.50 pass may turn in his pass to a Suburban bus operator and receive a credit of 50¢ towards the purchase of the \$1.50 pass.

Here are the new routes to begin April 4:

601 Delta FastBUS will connect the Tsawwassen area in south Delta with Richmond. From Tsawwassen, where it provides a local service, it operates over Point Roberts Road, Boundary Bay Road and Arthur Road to Ladner Trunk Road, to the temporary Ladner Exchange, then to Highway 17. Highway 99, Steveston Highway, No. 5 Road and Westminster Highway into Richmond centre.

602 Tsawwassen Heights FastBUS operates only during rush periods. In the Tsawwassen area, its local route is the same as 601. From there it travels via Point Roberts Road to Highway 17, looping into the temporary Ladner Exchange, then back to Highway 17 and non-stop into Vancouver via 99 and Granville Street. It travels to Hastings Street, looping through the downtown area with terminus on Hornby just north of Dunsmuir.

650 Deas Island FastBUS connects White Rock with downtown Vancouver. From White Rock, it travels via King George Highway to Highway 99, to Ladner Trunk Road, into the temporary Ladner Exchange. Then it returns to Highway 99 and follows the route of 602 into Vancouver.

#### New Routes have Radio-Equipped Buses

All the buses going into service on the new routes serving Delta and White Rock will have radio-telephones. These will provide instant communication between bus operators and Oakridge Transit Centre, Selective calling can be made to any bus.

Radio telephone communication will assist in various situations such as delays, accidents or mechanical problems. These FastBUSES are being equipped with radios first because they operate in areas where public telephones are infrequent and large areas are unpopulated. Eventually, all FastBUSES will have similar equipment.

Service on 601 will be every 30 minutes, 650 will be on a 30-minute schedule between Ladner and Vancouver and 60 minutes between Ladner and White Rock, with added service in rush periods.

Under the new fare tariff. the fare between Delta and Vancouver will be 60d each way, and between White Rock and Vancouver it will be \$1.00 each way. Off-peak period fares will be 15¢ less.

Timetables are being prepared for the new routes and wide distribution should commence on April 1.

New equipment will be used on these new routes. Buses will be General Motors manufacture of the FastBUS type. Some will have bucket type seats. Buses serving White Rock will have adjustable reclining seats, all facing forward.

#### **Expanded Fare Structure**

With the introduction of service from Vancouver into Delta and Surrey, a new fare structure becomes effective. Present fares in the Greater Vancouver area (four zones) will not change. However the following fares will apply to the total transit system:

ADULT Regular

25¢ for first zone

15¢ for second zone 20¢ for each additional zone

Off-Peak (1)

25¢ for first two zones 20¢ for each additional zone

STUDENT/SENIOR (2)

All Times

15¢ for first zone

10d for second zone

15¢ for each additional zone

CHILDREN

All Times

10¢ for first zone


5¢ for second zone 10¢ for each additional zone

(1) At all times except from 3 a.m. to 10 a.m. and from 3 p.m. to 7 p.m. Monday to Friday except

on official holidays. Upon presentation of a valid school certificate or Courtesy Card for Seniors respectively.

#### **New Fare Boxes** Take Paper Money


New fare boxes, already installed in some buses in the Greater Vancouver area, will be in all the new buses serving Delta and White Rock, These boxes are almost trouble-free which will eliminate road calls made necessary by the type now being replaced. Too, they will accept dollar bills although they cannot make change.



#### Zone Fares

This schematic explanation of the new fare zones will assist in calculating fares.

For example, Vancouver to Richmond is 2 zones = 25¢ + 15¢ = 40¢. Vancouver to Delta is 3 fare zones - 25¢ +15e + 20e = 60e. White Rock to Ladner = 3 fare zones - 25¢ + 15e + 20e = 60e. Maximum fare within the large circle plus Richmond large circle is 40¢. Therefore North Vancouver to White Rock = 40¢ +20c + 20c + 20c - \$1.00Off-peak fares are less in all areas.



- Fares within existing five zones operated by B.C. Hydro - Metropolitan Lines and West Vancouver Municipal Transportation remain unchanged.


