If rain should fall on the days you want to get out and do something, consider the great variety of indoor entertainment available and be thankful for it. B.C. Hydro buses can take you right to, or within walking distance, of all the attractions listed here. Call 324-3211 for information on how to get there by bus.

Bloedel Conservatory is a unique experience, magnificent floral gardens under a great geodetic dome. Here you can enjoy exotic plants and the flight of tropical birds in three zones — rain-forest, tropics and dry. Hours are 10 a.m. to 9:30 p.m., admission is  $75\phi$  for adults,  $25\phi$  for students and senior citizens.

The British Columbia Pavilion at Exhibition Park is an entertaining and educational experience. Special features are the huge three-dimensional map of the province and the Sports Hall of Fame, both subjects for hours of interesting study. Admission is free.

Vancouver Art Gallery and the Centennial Museum - H.R. MacMillan Planetarium - Maritime Museum complex both are centres of the arts and related activities. So much is going on all

the time that you need programs and they are available. No admission charge for the Gallery. Of great historic interest is the St. Roch, famous Arctic schooner of the R.C.M.P., now in drydock at the Maritime Museum.

The Aquarium in Stanley Park has one of the finest collections of salt and fresh water life anywhere, and can enthrall all ages for many hours even without the whale and dolphin performances. Hours are 10 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily, open to 9 p.m. weekends and holidays. Admission is \$2.50 for adults, 75¢ for students, children and seniors. Incidentally, the Aquarium offers three-day tours to Long Beach to study the Gray Whale in particular and the general flora and fauna of this fascinating area, with biologists in charge. Next departure June 25 – call 685-3364 for information.

Burnaby's Heritage Village with the nearby Arts Centre comprise another area of great interest and continuing activity. ### CHANGES TO CANADA WAY 820

Effective June 11, the Canada Way 820 FastBUS route will be altered. The new route will be from 8th Street at Columbia in New Westminster via 8th Street, Canada Way, Willingdon, Hastings and Burrard to the Dunsmuir – Melville Connector at Burrard. From Vancouver to New Westminster, the route is via Melville at Burrard, Thurlow, Hastings, Willingdon, Canada Way, 8th Street, Columbia, Begbie and Front to 8th Street at Columbia. Departure times from both termini will not be affected.

From New Westminster, stops will be made for boarding and alighting at all local stops up to and including Willingdon at Halifax (Brentwood). From this point, buses will discharge only at Hastings at Willingdon, Hastings at Kootenay, Hastings at Renfrew, Hastings at Commercial and Hastings at Main. From Main Street to the Vancouver terminus, passengers may alight at any stop.

From Vancouver, stops will be made for pick-up only at all FastBUS stops up to and including Hastings at Main. From this point, pick-up stops will be made at Hastings at Commercial, Hastings at Renfrew, Hastings at Kootenay and Willingdon at Hastings. From Willingdon at Halifax (Brentwood), stops will be made for boarding and alighting at all local stops.

This change is being made to better serve the people of central Burnaby residing along Canada Way and to provide faster service between Brentwood and downtown Vancouver. In July the Canada 820 will become a full transit service offering service from appreximately 6 a.m. until midnight.

### SPECIAL BUS SERVICES
