Children take a Buzzer trip

To thousands of Vancouver area schoolchildren he is as real as Popeye and Pluto were to an earlier generation of youngsters. In fact, Mr. Buzzer – B.C. Hydro's front-line crusader against bus vandalism – has all the credibility of a "genuine" Disneyland character.

Certainly he looks like one. His imitation head is several times too large and topped by curly red hair sprouting from beneath a miniature blue cap. Eyes as big as saucers match a jolly smile as he tours Lower Mainland elementary schools in his outsized bus driver's uniform, spreading the word among junior graders that thoughtless acts of vandaling on

city buses are costing their mums and dads and the taxpayers-at-large a whopping \$200,000 yearly.

He talks, too, about safety and the proper way to use the transit system. A colorful audio-visual presentation, featuring the Mr. Buzzer character in cartoon form, is followed by a short bus trip around the neighbourhood to acquaint children with the Do's and Don't's of public transportation. Afterwards, each student is given a coloring book to reinforce the message.

Explains Hydro official Bill Ellwyn, the man behind the program: "It's all designed to bring a better understanding of transit to the community, starting with the young, but extending to an adult audience in the long term."

Mr. Buzzer was "born" in late 1976 but did not make his public debut until early this year. Since then, he has visited elementary schools throughout North Vancouver and most of Burnaby and will soon move to Coquitlam. Plans call for him to visit every elementary school in the Lower Mainland over a three-year period and already he has talked to almost 15,000 children ranging from kindergarten age to grade seven.

Do they think he's real? The answer lies in the fact that when program coordinator Ray Maxwell, Mr. Buzzer's alter ego, took time off work for a recent vacation, many schoolchildren thought Mr. Buzzer was sick. The result: A sack full of letters and get-well cards for their new-found friend.
