

BUSES SERVE ROYAL HUDSON

The nostalgic whistle of British Columbia's famed Royal Hudson steam train will soon be heard again along the craggy cliffs and inlets of Howe Sound as it rumbles off to the start of its fourth season between North Vancouver and Squamish May 20. And B.C. Hydro is prepared with special bus service to get you to the train on time.

Between May 20 and June 25 inclusive, the Royal Hudson will operate Wednesday through Sunday, plus Victoria Day, May 22.

From June 26 to September 10, the steam train runs daily except Tuesdays while from September 15 to October 9, the one-day rail excursion operates Fridays, Saturdays and Sundays.

The train departs British Columbia Railway's North Vancouver station at 10 a.m. and returns at 4 p.m. On all days the train operates, buses displaying a card Train Connection) leaves the bus depot, Cambie and Dunsmuir streets, at 9 a.m. with passenger pick-up points along the route at Georgia and Granville, Georgia and Burrard, the north end of the Lions Gate Bridge and Marine Drive at Capilano.

Alternatively, a connecting service will operate from the Seabus terminal at Lonsdale Quay in North Vancouver direct to the train station, departing at 9 a.m. and returning to the Quay at 4 p.m. When necessary, there will be an additional

shuttle bus between the Seabus and the train at 9:15 a.m. weekdays only.

The same arrangements will be made for the return trip.

The Royal Hudson steam train winds through the scenic coastal fiords of Howe Sound and through the jagged peaks of the Coast Mountains to the Village of Squamish — a fun-filled and exciting one-day trip.

NEW TIMETABLES TO SHOW SERVICE CHANGES

Transit changes scheduled for May 12 in the Vancouver, North Vancouver, North Burnaby, and White Rock areas will be detailed in a new series of timetables available at that time.

Unaffected are Richmond, Coquitlam, Airport and Valleyto-Sea routes in addition to PNE, False Creek and Seabus services, the existing timetables for which remain effective through to August 4.

Areas of minor change are White Rock, North Vancouver and North Burnaby, the latter reflecting efforts to make the evening service times more consistent. But more significant changes are to be found in a number of key Vancouver routes.

Minimal patronage has led to the necessity to increase Beach Avenue service headways from 15 to 20 minutes after 6 p.m. Mondays through Saturdays and discontinue the service completely after 10 p.m. each evening. Sunday frequencies will be 20 minutes through the day on this route, ending at 10 p.m.

With the exception of the morning rush between 8:22 a.m. and 9:05 a.m. each weekday, every second trip until 6 p.m. on the Broadway service will terminate at Renfrew Street Loop in-

stead of continuing on to the Boundary Loop.

Also affected are the Granville/Victoria, Main/Robson and Davie/Kingsway services. On Mondays through Saturdays, the headways on these three lines will be increased from 10 to 12 minutes between 7 p.m. and 9 p.m., then to 15 minutes from 9 p.m. until midnight. On Sundays and holidays, the headways will also be increased from 12 to 15 minutes between 9 p.m. and midnight.

Similar frequencies will be established on the Fraser/Cambie line which goes from a 10 to a 12-minute headway on weekdays between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. On Saturdays, headways from 9 a.m. will be increased from 10 to 15 minutes and from 10 to 12 minutes between 9 a.m. and 6 p.m. while on Sundays and holidays, the headways will be a uniform 20 minutes before noon and every 15 minutes between noon and 6 p.m.

It should be noted in the New Westminster-South Burnaby timetable that the 99 Second leaves 8th and Columbia at 6:22 a.m. on Saturdays, not at 6:32 as shown.
