
NEW ROUTE SERVES GRANVILLE ISLAND

A new bus route has been introduced to serve Granville Island.

With a special subsidy by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, the route operates on a 20-minute frequency from 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. daily. A "Granville Island" sign in the front bus window will identify the bus which links the island with Broadway and Granville.

From the island terminus at the Creekhouse Restaurant, the route travels via Johnston St., Anderson St., 3rd Ave., Fir St., 6th Ave., Granville St., Broadway, Fir St., 3rd Ave., and back to the terminus via Anderson St.

Regular fares and transfers apply.

BUMPER STICKERS A SAFETY WINNER

B.C. Hydro Transit is taking action to back up its alreadysuccessful lights-on safety program in Greater Vancouver.

The "back-up" comes in the form of special glass-beaded, reflective tape stickers on rear bus bumpers, the first of their kind used by a transit system in North America.

Since starting the "lights-on" program, Hydro Transit has won national and international recognition for its vastlyimproved traffic safety record, including a top award last month from the American Public Transit Association. Under the lights-on program, drivers leave their headlights on whenever the bus is in motion to make it more visible to other drivers and to pedestrians and lessen the likelihood of being involved in an accident.

Now the program is being followed up, with the heavy-duty stickers on about half the system's nearly 900-bus motor and trolley coach fleet, carrying the message: "Winners...drive safely" in commemoration of the awards B.C. Hydro Tran has already earned.

Similar reflective stickers are in use by other transit properties, but the Hydro system is the first to carry a printed message on reflective tape. The printing is in brown on an orange background, the official colors of the transit system.

"More than ten per cent of our accidents involve buses being rear-ended," says Hydro Transit safety and training manager Peter Gleave.

"We will be monitoring the results of this campaign very carefully" he said. "We have the most improved vehicle accident rate for a major transit system in North America, and we're looking for still further improvements."


Classes begin the week of Sept. 10 but are filling quickly.

Robson closure disrupts service

Transit service in downtown Vancouver will be disrupted for approximately 10 days this month when Robson Street between Howe and Hornby will be resurfaced and closed to buses.

The closure starts with the first buses Aug. 7 and is estimated to end with the last buses Aug. 17.

Bus routes and detours are as follows:


5 Robson — via Pender, **Burrard** and Robson; 6 Fraser — via Robson, **Granville** and Pender; 15 Cambie — via Pender, **Granville** and Robson; 19 Kingsway — via Robson, **Thurlow**, **Haro-Smithe Connector**, **Burrard** and Pender; and Shoppers Freebus — via Granville, **Smithe** and Hornby in the west-bound direction, and via Robson, **Burrard**, **Nelson** and Granville heading eastbound.

Some schedule adjustments will be made to the Fraser/Cambie route during the temporary street closure. Check with transit information at 324-3211 for full details.

Robson street between Howe and Hornby is normally closed to all vehicular traffic except buses.

REGULAR TRANSIT routes serve the PNE from Downtown and suburbs. The 14 HASTINGS makes frequent trips daily along Hastings between Downtown and Kootenay Loop. To and from North Vancouver the 210 MOUNTAIN HWY stops at Renfrew on McGill, the 232 QUEENS stops at Cassiar and Hastings. Regular routes from Richmond and South Delta intersect at Broadway with the PNE EXPRESS VIA BROADWAY, From White Rock the 321 KING GEORGE stops on Hastings at Renfrew.

Everything from the hard rock group Heart to the Super Valu Circus are the headline attractions at this year's Pacific National Exhibition, and B.C. Hydro Transit has loads of special services to take you there and back.

For the Guiness Book of Records, there are new challenges: an egg whipping contest, "park-a-pig" competition, coin snatching, skateboarding, log birling, the largest turkey, the biggest doughnut, and more.

An outstanding photographic exhibit of worlds yet unknown to man will be displayed, the photos taken from NASA's Voyager I investigative space probe. The craft is expected to reach Saturn next year. And don't miss the moon rock from the Apollo 16 mission!

At Playland, Kiddieland has moved to its own area and several new rides have moved in, cyclone-paced attractions like Jet Star II and Super Loop.


Superstars headline this year's live performers: Joni Mitchell, Rolf Harris and the 50s rock-and-roll rage. Teen Angel and the Rockin' Rebels, to name a few.

During fair time, Country Fair alone reckons different booths will be giving away a total of 1,500 pounds of turkey goducts, 600 pounds of oysters, 60,000 mushrooms and 2,000 s! Local produce can be sampled, including a B.C. Wine arden.

The PNE's Livestock and Agriculture Show is one of the largest of its kind in Canada, with more than 3,000 animals entered by 2,000 exhibitors competing for a total of over \$160,000 in prize money. Most of the animals shown will never have been to the Fair before. And, if you want to see what \$15 million dollars worth of filet mignons on the hoof look like. trot over to the livestock barn. They'll all be lined up there for your inspection.

Still with Agriculture, there's another newcomer for urban dwellers who would like to know more about rural life and routines down on the farm. Two special evening shows have been scheduled Aug. 21 and 26, a sort of "everything you ever wanted to know about livestock...but were afraid to go into the barn and ask" scenario.

TRANSIT TO SERVICE **COOUITLAM CENTRE**
