NEW GUIDE, ROUTES ADDED THIS MONTH

A newly-revised transit guide is scheduled to be on sale by the end of the month in stationery departments of all Woodwards, Eatons and Bay stores.

Cost of the new guide is unchanged at 25 cents.

The guide contains up-to-date route information including numerous revisions since May when the last guide was produced.

TWO NEW ROUTES IN SURREY

Also as of the end of the month, two new weekday routes will be added in Surrey: the 338 Clayton and 343 Sullivan Heights.

The 338 Clayton connects Cloverdale and Guildford and there will be two trips daily: a morning trip from Cloverdale to Guildford arriving at 9:51 a.m. and an afternoon trip in the reverse direction leaving Guildford at 2:35 p.m.

The route starts at King George Hwy, and Hwy, 10 and travels via Hwy. 10, Old McLellan Rd., 60th Ave., 184th St., 80th Ave., 188th St., Harvie Rd., 92nd Ave., 182nd St., 96th Ave., 156th St., 104th Ave. to Guildford. The return route is the reverse of the above route.

The 343 Sullivan Heights is a circle route beginning and ending at Newton Exchange with two scheduled trips: one leaving Newton Exchange at 9:35 a.m. and the other leaving there at 2:48 p.m. The route follows 72nd Ave., 144th St., 56th Ave., 148th St., 72nd Ave., and back to Newton Exchange.

Like the Archibald, buses on both the Sullivan Heights and Clayton services may be flagged by passengers at any point en route.

The new routes begin service Oct. 26, the same day as 351 North Bluff becomes more uniform with the night routing changed to the same as the day routing.

Meanwhile the 325 service will extend its weekday halfhourly schedule to 6 p.m. between 88th Ave. and 140th Street and Newton Exchange.

New timetables will be issued for the following routes: Main/Robson, Fourth/Oak, Dunbar/Arbutus/Hastings Express, Davie/Kingsway, Granville/Victoria, False Creek/Seabus Burrard-Granville, Simon Fraser University, New Westminster/South Burnaby, North Burnaby, Coquitlam, North Vancouver, Surrey/North Delta and White Rock. Timetables not mentioned are in effect until January 31, 1980, so please check the expiry date on the front cover. Timetables are available from community centres, municipal halls, public libraries and shopping malls throughout B.C. Hydro Transit's service area.

BIKE RACK AT SEA-BUS

Sea-Bus has a new park-and-ride system for bicyclers.

A bike rack equipped to store 12 bicycles has been installed at Lonsdale Ouay, between the fare boxes and terminal uilding, says B.C. Hydro Transit, operator of the Sea-Bus vice.

The rack enables passengers to ride their bikes to the Sea-Bus terminal then cross over into downtown Vancouver on the passenger ferries. Hydro officials said. "We hope this will be a further convenience to North Shore patrons."
