Transit Team Heroes in Fire Rescue

When B.C. Hydro Transit operator Trevor MacFarlane reported for work Oct. 27 he wasn't planning on being a hero. Neither was transit supervisor Bob Gordon.

But both were and thanks to them at least one man is alive today having survived a fire at a Gastown rooming house.

MacFarlane, of 7540 Hurdle Cres., Surrey, and Gordon, of 7716 Lee Street, Burnaby, were working outside the rooming house at 225 Carrall Street about 9:30 p.m. assisting trolley coaches through a power outage on the overhead wires.

Without warning, smoke began pouring out windows of the building and MacFarlane and Gordon found themselves at the scene of a fire.

"The first thing I did was call the fire department," said Gordon, who worked as a volunteer fireman on the Prairies before joining B.C. Hydro Transit seven years ago.

"I ran into the rooming house and up the stairs to see if there was anyone trapped inside. I had a general idea where the fire was coming from, but it was hard to see because of the dense smoke and all the water pouring down from the sprinkler system.

"In one of the rooms, I found one man who was quite dazed and suffering from smoke inhalation, and I was leading him out of the building when MacFarlane came in to assist," Gordon said.

MacFarlane checked the other rooms and suffered a singed hand from a burning mattress.

"The whole thing happened in less than five minutes," MacFarlane said. "But thank goodness no one was seriously hurt."

MacFarlane, who has been a transit operator for five years said it was his first experience as being a hero.

Both received official commendations from B.C. Hydro Transit for their actions.

The areas of False Creek which have been under construction over the past months (Phase II) are just about completed.
