Trolley Route Extensions and Improved Park-and-Ride

Three existing trolley routes in Vancouver and Burnaby are to be extended as part of a \$125.7 million improvement package recently approved by the Greater Vancouver Regional District Board of Directors.

Greater Vancouver Transit System routes to be extended are: To U.B.C. along University Boulevard from the present trolley terminus at Blanca Loop; the #9 Broadway route from Boundary Road east to Brentwood Mall; the #8 Davie, #19 Kingsway and #41 Forty-First Avenue routes from Joyce Loop east along Kingsway to a new loop near Nelson Street in Burnaby.

Additional details on the three extensions appear in a G.V.R.D. report on the five-year capital program for Transit, approved by the Regional Board.

— 3 km extension into U.B.C. from Blanca Loop via University Boulevard would eliminate the need to use diesel buses over the entire distance into U.B.C. and could save up to \$65,000 per year in operating costs.

 2 km extension of the #9 Broadway route east from the present Boundary Road Loop to Brentwood Mall.

— 3 km extension of the #8 Davie, #19 Kingsway and the #41 Forty-First routes east from the present Joyce Loop to a new loop near Nelson Street that would provide improved service to the growing employment area around the Burnaby Metrotown, which includes the B.C. Tel head office.

These trolley extensions are estimated to cost approximately \$1.5 million and will be undertaken in the 1980-81 fiscal year.

The G.V.R.D.'s Five-Year Capital Budget for Transit also includes other improvements to the Transit System. Additional buses and trolleys are to be purchased and a number of parkand-ride stations in suburban areas are to be built or improved.

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New park-and-ride stations will be located in Delta, Coquitlam, Surrey and North Vancouver. A site in Richmond is presently in use.

Construction is expected to start in the fiscal year 1981-82 and all sites should be operational by 1984. Cost of this program is estimated at \$8.1 million.

In Richmond — The existing Sexsmith Loop park-and-ride lot will be expanded by the addition of 750 parking stalls, bringing the capacity of this facility to over 900.

In Delta — Proposals call for a 1,000 car facility adjacent to the Ladner Exchange.

In Surrey — Proposals call for a new 1,000 car facility for the southwest corner of Scott Road and King George Highway.

In Coquitlam — A proposed 500 to 1,000 car park-and-ride lot is planned for an area near the Brunette Interchange.

In North Vancouver — Another proposed 1,000 car lot would be incorporated in the redesign of the Phibbs Exchange at the north end of the Second Narrows Bridge.

A sixth park-and-ride station, to be located somewhere along the Barnet Highway west of the Lougheed Intersection is still in the preliminary planning stages.

DOWNTOWN SUBSTATION & PARK COMPLEX

Work has begun in downtown Vancouver on Western Canada's first civic park and underground substation complex. The joint B.C. Hydro-City of Vancouver project is located at the northeast corner of Dunsmuir and Richards Streets.

The substation is required to meet load growth and upgrade the security of electric supply to downtown customers. The entire electrical installation will be within the underground building. Above ground, the only sign of Hydro's installation will be six round ventilation shafts used to support greenhouse canopies over the terraced northern prosition of the park.

The park will have a banked lawn area to the south and a large ornamental pond featuring water fountains. A variety of evergreen flowering magnolia trees will border the park and attractive flowering shrubs and trees will blend with grocover plants throughout the park.

THE LOOK OF MUSIC
