## New Route for 51 Granville Island Now in Effect

The 51 GRANVILLE ISLAND bus now follows a new north-bound route from Broadway at Granville: Broadway, Fir, 3rd Ave., Anderson, Cartwright to Johnson on Granville Island. The return route has not changed.

This service operates seven days per week while the Emily Carr Art School is in session and when Monday is a statutory holiday. **At other times there is no service on Mondays.**

During periods when the art school is in session, there are two additional trips in the A.M. rush giving 5 minute service between 8:35 A.M. and 8:50 A.M., Monday through Friday.

## Tougher on Toughs

Recently, in Surrey Provincial Court, an 18-year-old man was given a four-month jail sentence for assaulting a bus driver. The judge said that "bus operators are public servants whose task is not made easy by having to deal with offensive passengers."

So far in 1981, M.T.O.C. Security Service has pursued charges in 40 cases . . . 21 have resulted in convictions and 18 are still before the courts.
