# Transit Service Changes Effective June 28

On Friday, June 28, revised service schedules will be implemented to reflect the seasonal changes in ridership. Most suburban corridors and local Vancouver routes will be adjusted for the summer months. A rider bulletin, which describes the changes in detail, will be distributed. Other notable changes are as follows:

In **Vancouver**, the **49 Forty Ninth** will not operate west of the Dunbar Loop and the **25 King Edward** will not operate west of the Blanca Loop during the summer months. Service to UBC on these routes (Monday through Friday during the peak periods) will resume on September 6.

In the **New Westminster** area, the western portion of the **108** route will change. The service will follow the usual route westbound to Marine at Willard, then via Willard, Trapp, 7th Ave., 23rd St. to 8th Ave., then the usual route. In **North Burnaby** please note the change to the **142 Edmonds-SFU** route. The service between Canada Way at Kensington and Sperling at Curtis will now travel via Kensington, Overpass, Kensington, Broadway, Sperling.

In North Vancouver a route change in the vicinity of 15th Street and the Grand Boulevard has affected the **240 Marine Drive** and **228 Lynn Valley** services. The terminus of the **240** is now on the south side of 15th Street, between Grand Boulevard W. and Grand Boulevard E. Enroute to Vancouver, the **240** loops in a clockwise direction via 15th Street, Grand Boulevard E., 13th Street, Grand Boulevard W., then west on 15th Street. Northbound in this area, the **228 Lynn Valley** travels via Grand Boulevard E., 13th Street, Grand Boulevard W., 15th Street, Grand Boulevard E., then the usual route.

In **Port Coquitlam**, the downtown routings of the **163 Prairie** and the **164 Coast Meridian** AM & PM commuter trips will change. Morning commuter trips to Vancouver will travel into the Town Centre via Shaughnessy, Wilson, loop through the Rec. Centre to Kingsway, then via Wilson, Shaughnessy, Lougheed and the usual route west. PM commuter trips entering the Town Centre from Vancouver will travel via Lougheed, Shaughnessy, Wilson, loop through the Rec. Centre to Kingsway, then via Wilson, Mary Hill, McAllister to terminus at Shaughnessy.

The **640 Valley-to-Sea**, between Surrey and Tsawwassen Ferry Terminal, will provide a greatly increased service for the summer months. This service will return to the fall and winter schedule on September 6.

In the **White Rock** area, the **354** will travel northbound from Pacific via Johnston, Thrift, Foster and terminate on North Bluff, just east of Foster. The AM commuters will continue north from Pacific via Johnston, North Bluff, 148th Street, 20th Avenue, Johnston, then follow the regular route to Vancouver. The **356 Cranley** northbound from Pacific will travel via Johnston to North Bluff.

Since May 19 the **353 Marine Drive** has offered a Sunday and Holiday service. This will continue until September 2.

# Three B.C. Transit drivers in top nine at national bus roadeo

On June 12, ten days after winning the B.C. Bus Roadeo's Government of the P.N.E. Grounds, Kamloops Transit operator Du Soderquist found himself competing against the best transit drivers in Canada. By the end of the day, Duane had scored 825 points out of a possible 890 at the Canadian Urban Transit Association Roadeo, held this year in Toronto, and had taken third place in a field of 30.

Two other B.C. Transit drivers followed close behind with 813 and 790 points. Sixth and ninth spots went to **Ernie Norman** of Surrey Transit Centre and **Rick Brown** of Victoria Transit Centre, respectively.

It will be a memorable year for the new champion from Kamloops. In the 10-year history of the B.C. Bus Roadeo, Duane was the first driver from outside Vancouver and Victoria to win the top spot. And, to crown his success in Toronto, he will have a crack at the prestigious American Public Transit Association Roadeo in October.

Ernie Norman was B.C.'s Grand Champion in 1980 and 1983 and was the first B.C. driver to win the APTA Roadeo — a feat he accomplished at the 1983 Roadeo in Denver. This year he was third over-all and top driver in the 'City' category at the B.C. Roadeo.

Rick Brown was Victoria's top driver at the B.C. Bus Roadeo.

Randy Peck of Penticton, who didn't compete in Toronto, was runnerup to the Grand Champion at the B.C. Bus Roadeo.

Roadeo competitors earn points for driving skills, safety habits, smoothness of operation, personal appearance and the results of a written test. Ten tests on the course put drivers through every manoeuvre they could possibly need to execute in normal service.
