
You can board at any of 15 stations along the 22 kilometre SkyTrain line, from New Westminster to Vancouver's Waterfront.

15 Cambie/Downtown via Cambie Bridge

With the opening of the new Cambie bridge, it will become part of the route of the 15 Cambie/Downtown service.

From the terminus at 64th & Cambie, northbound **15 Downtown** buses will be routed via Cambie, Cambie Bridge, Smithe, Hamilton and Robson to the downtown terminus at Robson & Granville.

At Robson & Granville, destination signs will be changed to **15 Cambie** and buses will continue on Robson to Burrard, then along Burrard, Pender, Granville, Robson, Cambie, Nelson, Cambie Bridge and Cambie Street to the terminus at 64th & Cambie.

17 Oak/Downtown service will also be rerouted across the Cambie Bridge at a later date.



Please note: A system as complex as SkyTrain naturally requires some fine-tuning. Some delays in schedules are possible during these special preview days.

As yet, there is no elevator access to Granville Station. Travellers who can't use the escalator are advised to exit SkyTrain at Burrard Station, where they can call Vancouver Taxi for shuttle transport to the Granville Station entrance.

January 3, 1986. SkyTrain soars into full commuter service.

You'll be glad to learn that when full commuter service begins, taking off by SkyTrain will cost no more than commuting by bus or SeaBus.

If you start your trip by bus or SeaBus, you'll pay your fare in the usual manner, then use your transfer to ride SkyTrain.

Paying fares will be even handier when you start your trip from a SkyTrain station. New self-serve ticket machines are conveniently located at each station entrance.

And to help facilitate the smooth introduction of SkyTrain to your total transit service, we'll be making changes to bus routes in two stages:

On January 3, 1986, only a few bus routes will be changed. For the most part, these changes will be the extension of existing bus routes to SkyTrain stations.

Then, once you've become familiar with SkyTrain, more extensive changes to bus routes will be made in March, 1986. At that time, "feeder" buses will connect you to any of the 15 SkyTrain stations. From there, you'll continue your trip via SkyTrain to downtown Vancouver or beyond, via SeaBus, to North Vancouver.
