# Minister turns sod for SkyTrain Extension

The Hon. Rita M. Johnston, Minister of Municipal Affairs, and Burnaby Mayor Bill Lewarne, chairman of the Vancouver Regional Transit System, welcomed media and guests to an official ground-breaking ceremony in New Westminster, February 12.

Following a briefing session at the Royal Towers Hotel, the minister operated a bulldozer to turn the first sod at 6th Street and Clarkson.

The 3.1-kilometre line to Scott Road in Surrey, including, of course, the world's longest cable-stayed bridge designed solely for rapid transit, will cost \$179 million. Service is scheduled to commence February, 1990.

In her remarks, the minister said: "The City of New Westminster, along with Burnaby and Vancouver, is now reaping the rewards of SkyTrain-related development. As one of the fastest-growing communities in Canada, Surrey will also be able to enjoy the benefits that a modern, efficient transportation system brings with it."

## New entrance at SkyTrain 29th Avenue Station

The stairway at the east end of the 29th Avenue Station has now been opened for public use. This will provide easier access for passengers who live east of the station and have valid passes, and for those transferring to and from the #16 bus.

Those wishing to buy tickets or validate FareSavers must continue to use the machines at the main entrance.

### Timetable corrections

Please note that the fare information panel in the February 16th issue of the **16 29th Avenue Stn/Downtown** timetable is incorrect. The rates remain the same as they have been since April 1, 1986, and the transit information number is 261-5100.

There is an error in the schedule for the 320 Guildford/Langley service, listed on page 9 of the Surrey Timetable. A #320 trip does not leave New Westminster Station at 6:26 a.m. Passengers should board the 321 White Rock Centre which leaves New Westminster Station at 6:27 a.m., and transfer to the 320 Langley at Whalley. The #320 leaves Whalley at 6:47 a.m.

# One year supervised probation for assaulting Station Agent

A youth who refused to extinguish a cigarette on a station platform, shoulder blocked the station attendant three times on the chest, almost knocking her into a guideway where a train was approaching.

Vancouver Police detained the youth at the next station and charged him with assault. In Vancouver Provincial Court he was given a suspended sentence, placed on one year supervised probation and ordered to perform 50 hours of community service work.

When space is available, Saturdays, Sundays and holidays only, bicycles may be taken aboard SeaBus. A separate adult fare is required for each bicycle.

Bicycles are not allowed in SkyTrain stations or on board SkyTrain at any time.
