White Rock/South Surrey open houses assist in the planning process

At November open houses held in White Rock/South Surrey, over 450 local residents viewed and commented on proposed route and service changes.

As a result, the proposed changes were revised by BC Transit planners to reflect some key concerns of the residents. These revisions were finalized after consultation with the City of White Rock and District of Surrey and were approved by the Vancouver Regional Transit Commission, March 20, 1987.

Changes to be implemented June 29

The #353 service to 22nd Street Station, which operates Monday through Saturday, will follow a new route in New Westminster.

With the addition of the #353 service to 22nd Street Station, the level of service on the #351 route will be reduced during the mid-day period.

The #350 route will be revised slightly to provide service to Cherrybrook Estates, at the intersection of King George Highway and 16th Avenue.

A change to be implemented September 7

Service on the existing #345 route will be improved: buses will operate every two hours, Monday through Saturday, between White Rock Centre and Guildford.

Boarding and alighting at multi-bus zones

At bus zones designed to accommodate two or more buses, uncontrolled boarding and alighting could lead to accidents. Passengers are therefore asked to be patient while operators follow the procedure laid down by BC Transit.

- The first two buses in the zone will allow passengers to board or alight.
- Any following buses will allow passengers to alight if the operators decide that their vehicles are in safe positions, but passengers may not board.
- Passengers waiting to board are asked to wait until their bus reaches one of the first two positions in the zone.

Transfers are for one-way travel

When you pay your fare and get a fare receipt/transfer, you have at least 90 minutes to transfer to SkyTrain, SeaBus or any bus or series of buses that will take you to your destination.

You may not, however, retrace your route on the same fare receipt/transfer. The same rule applies to FareSavers used to pay SeaBus and SkyTrain fares. If the validity of your fare receipt/transfer should be questioned, please retain it and pay the fare. The fare receipt/transfer should then be submitted with details of the dispute (including vehicle number, route and time of dispute) to:
