

## New dollar coin will be introduced July 1st.

Circulation of some 100 million of the new, eleven-sided, gold-coloured dollar coins will begin July 1st.

Transit systems across Canada have been waiting for this day for many years, since the new coins can be handled more efficiently than dollar bills. They won't block fareboxes and counting will be faster and less expensive. The saving to BC Transit is expected to be several hundred thousand dollars a year.

## System Tune-Ups

Minor service adjustments are being implemented as part of the ongoing process to match service levels with passenger demand.

#### 3 Main/Robson


