
The BC Transit entertainers



The GoCard & Your Student ID Card: What a Convenient Combination!

This year, the Transit Strip turns your student card into a GoCard. How do you get yours? Easy. You'll automatically get your GoCard when you have your school picture snapped. So don't miss your appointment with the school photographer.

The GoCard Lets You Go at Substantial Savings!

The GoCard Transit Strip on your student card is special: with it, eligible students can ride the transit system, anywhere within the Vancouver Regional Transit System's service area, for about half the adult fare. Use it on SkyTrain, SeaBus, regular buses or West Vancouver blue buses. During peak hours — before 9:30 a.m. and between 3:00 and 6:30 p.m. Mondays to Fridays — a valid GoCard will save you almost 50% over the full adult fare.

Here's a comparison

	One zone	Two zones	Three zones
Concession	\$.60	\$.80	\$1.10
Adult	\$1.15	\$1.55	\$2.20

In off-peak hours your valid GoCard allows you to ride for a flat fare of 60 cents — as compared to \$1.15 for adults.

If You're Eligible, Give the GoCard a Go!

- To be eligible for the GoCard strip, you must:
- □ live within the transit service area.
- be aged 14 to 19 (inclusive) or in grade 8 at the start of the school year;
- □ attend classes full time at a public or private school grades 8 to 12 (inclusive)

Carry Your GoCard at All Times

In order to ride for a concession fare you must show your GoCard. If you don't have it with you, you must pay the adult fare.

Don't Lend your GoCard

The GoCard is not transferable. So if the face on the Card doesn't match the face of the user, the Card will be confiscated.

It's also important to remember that misuse of a GoCard is obtaining transportation by fraud — a criminal offence. If you leave the school system, your GoCard must be return to the school principal.

Last School-year's GoCards

will be valid until October 15, 1987, but you can use your new Student ID/GoCard as soon as it is issued (approximately two weeks after the photographer's visit).

Increased inspection almost halves fare evasion

Earlier this year, BC Transit security staff surveyed over 98,000 Bus, SkyTrain and SeaBus passengers in a comprehensive, system-wide fare payment audit. Results indicate that the use of fare inspectors and the efforts of transit operators have almost halved fare evasion, with an approximate annual saving of \$1.8 to \$1.9 million.

The small percentage of passengers who continue to travel without paying the proper fare (estimated at 1.9 to 2.3 percent) are reminded that BC Transit Mobile Patrol Investigators have been instructed to issue tickets for fare violations.

These tickets, which carry fines of from \$30 to \$50 for fare evasion, are backed by the full weight of the provincial court system, with recourse for follow-up if the fine isn't paid. BC Transit has also successfully prosecuted a person for fare fraud, under the Criminal Code of Canada.

Passengers should always check that they have the correct proof of payment before entering a SkyTrain or SeaBus "Fare Paid Zone", when crossing a zone boundary and when transferring to a bus. If in doubt about what the correct fare should be, consult a time-table, ask a SkyTrain or SeaBus attendant, or a bus operator. Transit information can also be accessed by using the free information telephones at SkyTrain stations or by calling 261-5100.

131/132 Edmonds Stn./Kootenay Loop
