Help celebrate Stanley Park's 100th Birthday Sunday, June 19



The June 17 issue of the Buzzer will carry full details of the "Sunday in the Park" events organized to celebrate 100 years of pleasure for the people of Vancouver and countless visitors.

With large crowds expected, cars will not be allowed in the Park. A free 5-minute shuttle bus service will operate within the Park, carrying celebrants to the four main entertainment locations: Ceperley Playground & 2nd Beach, Lumberman's Arch, Prospect Point Picnic Grounds and Lower Brockton Oval. This shuttle service will replace the regular **52 Around the Park** for the day.

It would also be a good idea to get to the Park by bus. The **19 Stanley Park** operates along Pender and Georgia Streets in the downtown area, to Stanley Park Loop (Chilco and Georgia). In addition, the **3 Robson** and **8 Davie** provide service into the West End, leaving just a short walk into the Park.

Consideration for fellow passengers

A retired bus operator called recently to tell us how some passengers on the buses he rides make travel more difficult for others.

As examples he cites the people who take two seats by putting clothing or other belongings beside them, the people who sit on an aisle seat with an empty window seat beside them, and those who stop and talk halfway down a crowded bus, blocking off seats at the rear and often limiting the number of passengers who can board. We suspect that these things are often done unwittingly . . . a little more awareness of others' needs could make transit more comfortable for everyone, particularly during morning and afternoon peak periods.
