Columbia Station opening

BC Transit operators buck traffic accident trend to record safest year ever.

Nearly 2,000 BC Transit operators in Greater Vancouver and Greater Victoria set a new traffic safety record in 1988 with the lowest traffic accident rate in the history of Vancouver and Victoria transit.

The Hon. Rita M. Johnston, minister responsible, told the men and women who drive the 886-bus fleet conventional transit fleet: "It's an impressive achievement! You're doing a great job."

The BC Transit fleet rate — the number of traffic incidents per million miles operated — decreased in 1988 by 8.2 per cent. This followed a 10.7 per cent decrease in 1987.

Since 1977, transit in Greater Vancouver and Greater Victoria has won 16 national and international safety awards in passenger, traffic and employee categories.

In continuing to set new traffic safety records, BC Transit operators are bucking the trend in British Columbia. General road accident statistics continue to go in the opposite direc-

1988 Vancouver Police Department statistics, for instance, show fatal accidents up by 62 per cent over 1987, pedestrian fatalities up by 37 per cent, and cyclists killed in traffic accidents up by 100 per cent. Traffic accidents in general increased by 7.6 per cent over the previous year.

Congratulations to the 1765 Vancouver region operators who drive 534 diesels and 244 trolleys, and the 240 Victoria region operators who drive 108 diesels.

Next stop Surrey

Columbia Station official opening

Premier Bill Vander Zalm and Municipal Affairs Minister Rita Johnston officially opened Columbia Station on Tuesday morning, February 14th, and the first train in revenue service rolled out of the station at noon.

Columbia is the 16th SkyTrain station, and the opening marks the first phase of the \$179 million expansion to Surrey.

As the first train broke a "Coming Through" banner spanning the tracks, the premier said it was symbolic of a province on the move. "This is an opportunity province," he told the large gathering of invited guests and members of the public. "The world knows it and is making investments in our future."

Mrs. Johnston, minister responsible for transit, said "The SkyTrain corridor is a great panorama of development from the waterfront in downtown Vancouver, through Burnaby to New Westminster. It's the fastest growing transit corridor in North America, with current and planned developments exceeding five billion dollars. Today, we're extending that corridor and Columbia Station is revitalizing another section of New Westminster."

"Next February, one short year from now, we'll extend the SkyTrain corridor to Scott Road in Surrey," she said . . .

"transit planners estimate daily ridership into and out of Scott Road will be between 12,000 and 14,000."

Other dignitaries in attendance at the opening included West Vancouver Mayor Don Lanskail, Chairman of the Vancouver Regional Transit Commission, New Westminster Mayor Betty Toporowski, Vancouver Mayor Gordon Campbell, Richmond Mayor Gil Blair, Port Moody Mayor David Driscoll and BC Transit Chairman Stu Hodgson.

The new twin-track station, midway along a 325-metre tunnel, is accessible from Columbia, Fourth and Clarkson Streets in New Westminster. It has several enhanced safety features including security television cameras that pan, tilt, zoom and record events, and improved radio communications. At the Fourth Street entrance, underground heater cables will melt ice and snow for passenger safety.

Mrs. Johnston reminded those present that Greater Vancouver has an integrated transit system that is second to none in any city in North America of similar size. "Transit in Denver has 53 million passenger boardings a year, Dallas 4 million, San Diego 25 million, San Antonio 33 million, Phoenix 18 million, Seattle 82 million. The transit system in the Vancouver region has 169 million boardings a year . . . As fast, efficient rapid transit moves into Surrey, Coquitlam and the northeast region, Richmond and the Vancouver International Airport area, more and more people will be able to leave their cars at home."
