Quarterly Transit Service Adjustments

More accessible transit for people with disabilities

The BC Transit Board of Directors has decided that all new buses purchased for the Vancouver Regional Transit System will come equipped with wheelchair lifts.

Approximately 85 new diesel buses slated for delivery in 1990 will be the first to offer this special service.

The Board has also revised its policy concerning scooters. For a 15-month period, beginning July 1, 1989, people who ride in three-wheeled motorized scooters will be able to use the handyDART system providing they are willing to waive any claim of damage arising from the design, construction or physical condition of the scooter. In the same period, transit officials will work to alleviate safety problems. \$50,000 has been budgeted to conduct crash tests, consider possible securement adjustments and discuss design specifications with scooter manufacturers.

These decisions followed a recommendation from the Custom Transit Task Force, comprised of Vancouver Mayor Gordon Campbell, Jackie Drysdale of Rossland and Eric Clarke of Victoria. The Task Force thoroughly examined the needs of disabled people throughout the province. Communication channels included public meetings and a survey.

50 Gastown/False Creek South



New trial service to White Pine Beach in Belcarra Park

The Vancouver Regional Transit Commission has approved a limited transit service to White Pine Beach in Belcarra Park, commencing Monday June 26. On three trips each day, for a two-month trial period, the 148 Belcarra/New Westminster Station route will be extended from Ioco to White Pine Beach. Ridership will be closely monitored to see if the extended route should become permanent in future years.

Bus radios approved

The BC Transit Board of Directors has approved a \$6.7 million budget that will see the entire diesel and trolley bus fleet in the Vancouver region equipped with a sophisticated radio system within the next two years. Included is the establishment of remote transmitting stations and communications facilities, and the installation of a variety of support equipment.

The contract for the total design and supply of the system has been awarded to Mobile Data International (MDI) of Richmond, B.C.

The Honorable Rita M. Johnston, minister responsible, said the Board's decision was good news for members of the public and BC Transit employees. "The installation of radios on the buses will improve safety conditions, assist in emergencies and enhance bus performance," said the minister. "It will increase security for passengers and staff, act as a deterrent for vandals, and allow operators to summon medical assistance in the event of an accident or an on-board emergency."

Described as a "computer-based dispatch system," the program will include radios for operators on buses and a separate radio system for supervisors, and security and maintenance personnel. Both systems will allow direct communications between employees on the road and Transit Control, providing operators and supervisors with current information on road conditions and detours.
