# New SkyTrain cars ordered

The SkyTrain fleet of 114 rapid transit cars will be boosted by another 16 vehicles to cope with the growing ridership demands on the system. UTDC, Inc, of Montreal, the original designer and manufacturer of SkyTrain, was awarded the \$33 million contract. The first cars from the new order will be delivered early in 1991.

The Honorable Rita M.Johnston, minister responsible, said that ridership, currently 25 million a year, is growing by about 11 per cent a year.

By the mid-1990's, BC Transit estimates the SkyTrain system will need an additional 16 cars, over and above the current order.

# **SkyTrain station for** Whalley Town Centre

BC Transit's board of directors has given the green light for construction of a SkyTrain station in Whalley Town Centre and ordered negotiations to proceed for two others in Surrey.

The decision follows a BC transit invitation to developers for expressions of interest in funding the capital cost of SkyTrain stations that could be integrated into planned development sites.

Four proposals were received and while none was fully accepted as proposed, the board has instructed BC Transit staff to pursue negotiations with three development companies for stations in the vicinity of 108th Avenue and 134th Street, and 100th Avenue and King George Highway.

#### 104th - immediate go-ahead

Because of the strategic importance of the station at 104th Avenue and 134th Street, BC Transit will fund and build an interim station and bus loop as originally approved in 1985 and attempt to recover the costs from future developments on the site and adjacent properties.

# SkyTrain/SeaBus Ticket Machines will accept \$5 bills

Ticket vending machines in all SkyTrain stations and Sea terminals are being modified to accept \$5 bills, in addition to the \$1 and \$2 bills which have always been accepted. The modifications are expected to be completed by December 1. Long time riders will may recall that \$5 bills were accepted during Expo, but the machines were later reprogrammed when the Canadian Mint redesigned the \$2 bill and both old and new designs had to be accepted.

The machines will issue change in 'loonies', quarters, dimes and nickels, unless the "Sorry, no change" sign is displayed. As always, bills should be in good condition, and must be inserted unfolded, face up, head first. If the "Coins only" panel is lit and you only have bills, please use another machine.

BC Transit's Designated Drivers will take you home safely

Don't take the keys" urges people to plan ahead not to drink and drive - to leave the keys at home rather than be tempted later on. It also provides a safe, legal alternative to drinking and driving – the transit system, headed up by its team of more than 2,000 "designated drivers" who move buses, SeaBuses and SkyTrain on 143 routes throughout the Vancouver Regional Transit System's 1,500 square kilometre service

The "Keys" campaign operates in conjunction with Counter-Attack, a program that began 12 years ago and has since seen a 50 per cent drop in alcohol-related traffic accidents.

Counter Attack focuses on deterrence. "Don't take the keys" is a complementary awareness campaign that offers transit as a viable alternative to drinking and driving - a life saving alternative.

Again this year BC Transit has contacted 40,000 businesses in the Lower Mainland, encouraging them to help ensure a safe journey home for staff, friends and family. How? By giving LifeSavers as gifts and /or by increasing employee awareness of the importance of planning ahead by posting "Don't take the keys" posters and other collateral materials in the workplace. A personalized transit itinery service, a planner that lists transit service available to and from companies' seasonal functions, is also available to them.

LifeSavers are transit tickets valid for one-way travel by bus, SeaBus and SkyTrain between December 1, 1989 and January 31, 1990. They can be used for one, two or three-zone trips after 9:30 a.m., Monday through Friday, and anytime Saturday and Sunday. Ask your manager about LifeSavers.
