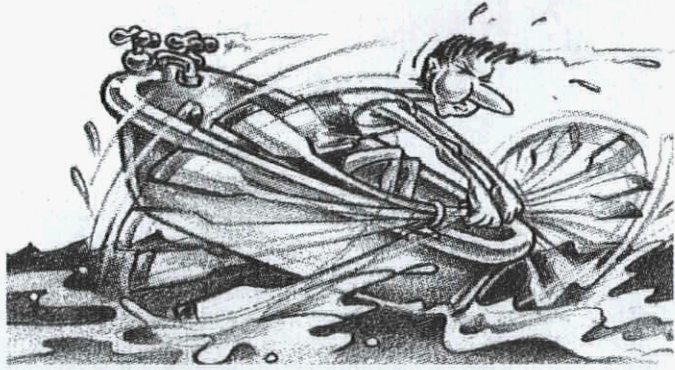


How do you get to the Vancouver Sea Festival?

If you can't row to the Sea Festival, July 16-19, take transit.

A 1 Beach, 3 Robson or 8 Davie bus will take you to the festivities at English Bay. A 22 Knight/ Macdonald will deliver you to the fun at Kits Beach and SkyTrain will fly you directly to the events being held at Science World and the Plaza of Nations. Extra Transit Service for Benson & Hedges Symphony of Fire, July 29-August 8



This international spectacular, which last year attracted more than 1.3 million spectators, promises to reach new heights of light, music and pyrotechnical artistry as teams from the United Kingdom and Canada challenge last year's Gold Trophy winners from Australia. Australia will open the competition on Wednesday July 29, followed by the U.K. on Saturday August 1 and Canada on Wednesday August 5. Each show will begin at 10:15 pm. A Grand Finale on Saturday August 8 will feature a display by each of the three teams.

Beat the traffic and parking hassle: take transit

With the West End, from Beach Avenue to Robson and Thurlow to North Lagoon Drive, closed to vehicular traffic (except buses, taxis and residents' cars) from 7:30 to 11:00 pm, and Kitsilano Point closed from 6:00 to 11:00 pm, transit is the way to go. Extra bus, SeaBus and SkyTrain service will be provided.

Beginning at 7:30 on each of the four evenings, extra buses will operate on major city routes into the downtown core. From downtown, shuttle service to Denman and Davie will be provided on the #3 Robson and #8 Davie routes. SkyTrain riders should transfer to one of these shuttle services at Granville Station.

After the event, from approximately 10:30 pm, extra buses will operate on major city and suburban routes which leave from downtown or connect with SkyTrain and SeaBus.

SkyTrain will run approximately every 5 minutes with the final train leaving Waterfront Station at 1:15 am. SeaBus will operate every 30 minutes with the last sailing leaving Waterfront Station at 12:47 am.

Courtesy shuttle buses, sponsored by Benson & Hedges, will operate between BC Place and the event beginning at 7:30 pm.

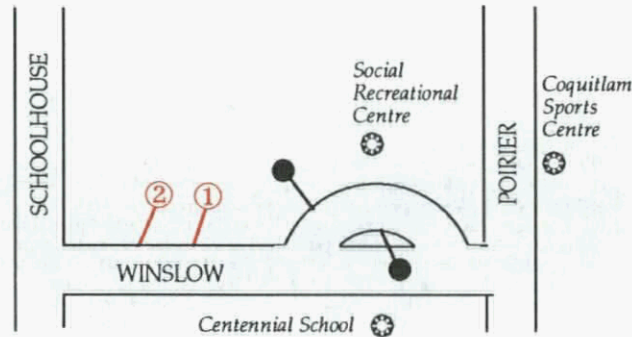

Stopping arrangements at Coquitlam Rec Centre revised

Buses no longer stop inside the loop on Winslow Avenue. They now stop further west, on Winslow Avenue. To accommodate this change, minor revisions have also been made to the routes of #151, 152, 154, 155 and 156 buses.

More cyclists taking to the water

Since cyclists were granted increased accessibility to SeaBus (October 1990) and the fare for accompanying bicycles was dropped (December 1, 1990) ridership has increased dramatically.

In the year ending March 31, 1991, 4,049 bicycles were carried on SeaBus. The following year saw a 334 per cent increase, to 17,956. Cyclists can now use SeaBus at any off-peak time (9:30 am to 3:00 pm and after 6:30 pm on weekdays and all day Saturday, Sunday and holidays). They pay only the regular adult or concession fare and their accompanying bicycles are carried free. A maximum of six bicycles is allowed on each sailing.

Please note that bicycles must remain in the control of their owners at all times and must NOT be ridden on or off SeaBus. This includes the use of ramps, walkways and sidewalks.

Cyclists should board through the SeaBus doorway closest to the land and remain in the stern section. They should wait until other passengers have left before disembarking.

Update: Bicycle Locker pilot program

35 of the 40 lockers made available for the one-year pilot program are leased for the third quarter, July 1 to September 30.

The 20 lockers at Scott Road Station and the 10 lockers at Sexsmith Park & Ride are fully leased and there is a short waiting list.

Four of the 10 lockers at Ladner Exchange are leased.

The cost of a three-month lease is \$15, plus a \$20 deposit.
