

Plenty of free spaces available for those who prefer to Park & Ride

There are 19 Park & Ride lots with a total capacity of more than 5,500 vehicles in the Vancouver Regional Transit System. To encourage their use, most of these facilities are provided free of charge on a first come basis; the exceptions are Park & Ride lots at King George* and Scott Road Stations. At Scott Road, 102** of the 2,400 stalls are available to those who pay. Scott Road also has priority parking for registered car pool partners (at least three in the car); phone 540-3453 for details.

Some lots operate at close to capacity levels: Scott Road Station, Pitt Meadows, Coquitlam Centre and Phibbs Exchange are examples. But most have plenty of space available for those who would enjoy the convenience of combining the use of their cars with the lower costs of environmentally friendly transit.

Is it possible you might party the night of the hockey game?

Alcohol can often be found wherever sports are played. So can excitement, camaraderie, a free-spending spirit and a tendency to feel that problems and responsibilities will take care of themselves. But the fact is that alcohol impairment is a major cause of collisions, costing 20 per cent of every insurance dollar and a great many injuries and deaths.

Before heading for Canucks games, plan a way of getting home safely from Pacific Coliseum

Take bus/SkyTrain (a special shuttle operates non-stop from 29th Avenue Station at approximately 60 and 30 minutes before the game) or one of the many buses that pass the PNE.

After the final whistle, shuttle buses operate to 29th Avenue Station, stopping as requested at stops along the route.

Alternatives include taking a cab or forming a car pool with a designated driver.

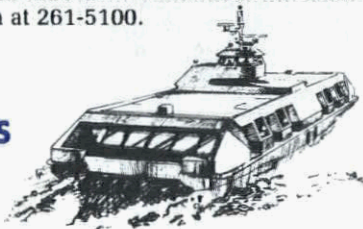
Changes in operating procedures #232 and #236 routes

The 236 Grouse Mountain/Phibbs Exchange now operates all year long to Grouse Mountain and every other 232 Pemberton Heights/Grouse Mountain/Lonsdale Quay trip travels only as far as the Capilano Suspension Bridge. Passengers travelling to Grouse Mountain from Vancouver can take the #246 and transfer to a #232 at Edgemont Village at 15 minutes past the hour, or to a #236 on Capilano Road at 45 minutes past the hour.

For Grouse Mountain to Edgemont Village passengers, #232 trips leave hourly, on the hour; and #236 trips leave hourly, at 30 minutes past the hour. #236 passengers can transfer to a #232 at the Capilano Suspension Bridge.

Over 47,000 bike/rider trips on SeaBus last year



In the year ending March 31, 1991, 4049 bikes/riders were carried on SeaBus. Since then accessibility has been increased by allowing bicycles on board during rush hours (September 1992) and the number of people using the service has quickly climbed.

In the following two years the figures were 17,956 and 31,280 respectively, for increases of 343% and 74%. Last year, ending March 31, 1994, bike/rider trips climbed a further 53% to 47,936. And increases were not limited to the summer months; the greatest increase was recorded in January (121%) with August second (85%).

For those wishing to take their bicycles aboard SeaBus, the following procedures must be followed:

- Retain control of the bicycle at all times and walk it while on SeaBus property, including ramps, walkways, sidewalks and the bus loop.
- Use the end of the waiting room closest to land, enter and leave SeaBus by the end door, sit in the rear section and hold the bicycle clear of doors and aisles.
- Enter and leave Seabus behind other passengers.
- Respect the convenience of other passengers and take every precaution to avoid marking the facilities.

Note: tricycles, tandems and mopeds cannot be carried.

GoCards for Grades 8 to 12

If you have missed the school photo session

you will pay a \$5 fee to have a GoCard produced. GoCard photography sessions are available now at Photo Ident and Mountain West Studios (see addresses and requirements below), and from October 22 to December 6 they will be available at a mobile unit which will travel to many locations throughout Greater Vancouver. In the meantime...

last year's students who are still attending secondary schools can use their 1993/94 GoCards until October 31, 1994. If a GoCard has been lost over the summer it should be replaced immediately by going to:

Photo Ident, 5317 Lane Street, Burnaby (near Royal Oak SkyTrain Station) or Mountain West Studios, 1073 Roosevelt Crescent, North Vancouver.

The hours are 9:00 am to 4:30 pm, Monday to Friday. An appointment is not necessary. A GoCard application form (available at the school office) signed by a school official, proof of age (birth certificate or CareCard) and a \$5 fee are required.

New Grade 8 students are able to pay Concession fares without GoCards until October 31, 1994. These students should advise the driver of their age, grade and school when boarding. If they encounter a problem, they are advised to pay the adult fare and note the time of travel, the bus number and operator number and call BC Transit Customer Relations at 540-3040 with this information.

GVRD's new Commuter Cycling Map available free

If you would like to know the best and safest way to get from point A to point B by bicycle, this is the map for you. Recommended cycle routes are clearly marked on large region-wide maps and extensive information is provided on how to use particular roads, bridges and ferries. There is also a section on the laws and regulations governing the use of a bicycle. The map is available at municipal halls, VanCity Savings branches and bicycle shops.
