Fully accessible and neighbourhood friendly, this 8-metre (26-foot) vehicle can easily transport 22 seated passengers. Its low-floor design with no steps to climb, makes boarding easy for passengers in wheelchairs or scooters. or for those who have difficulty with stairs. That's why the CUB is your CommUnity Bus.

The CUB is now providing service on routes #353, 354, 355 and 356 in Surrey and White Rock, on routes #502, 506, 507 and 511 in Langley, on routes #705, 709, 712, 721 and 722 in Maple Ridge and on routes #102, 103 and 108 in New Westminster.



Suburban commuter (Express) services have limited stopping procedures Please find out where you can get off before boarding

Before boarding an unfamiliar limited-stop commuter bus, please check the timetable or phone transit information for detailed stopping information.

Suburban commuter services with route number 101 or higher, provide local service within their suburban service areas and limited-stop service within Vancouver. In other words, they are designed to get out-of-town commuters to and from the city as quickly as possible.

For example, the stops beyond the Oak Street Bridge for Vancouver-bound suburban services, such as the #401, 403, 406 and 407 from Richmond, are **for dropoff only** and are limited to Marine at Oak and Hudson, Granville at 64th Ave, 49th Ave, 41st Ave, King Edward, Broadway, Bridge approach, Seymour at Davie and then all regular bus stops to the terminus. The reverse is true as suburban-bound services head back to the Oak Street Bridge. They stop at the same points in Vancouver but for pick-up only. Those planning to stay in Vancouver should take a local bus. Limited-stop service also applies on some specialized routes: #10 Hastings Express, #22 Macdonald Express, #32 Downtown/Dunbar Loop, #85 UBC and #99 B-Line

Please understand that in order to do their intended job, these services cannot make unscheduled stops.

Timetables carrying detailed stopping information are available are available at public libraries, city and municipal halls, community centres, Travel InfoCentres, chambers of commerce, and the BC Transit Lost Property Office at Stadium Station. The Transit Information number is 521-0400. For West Vancouver Blue Buses the number is 985-7777.

GoCards for Grades 8 to 12

A GoCard/Student I.D. identifies the owner as someone who is eligible to travel on the Vancouver Regional Transit System for a Concession fare. The necessary photograph is taken at an inschool session and the GoCard is issued approximately two weeks later. There is no charge for GoCards issued in this way. To be eligible for a GoCard a student must:

- · live within the school service area
- be 14 to 19 years old (inclusive) or be in Grade 8 at the start of the school year
- attend classes full time at a public or private school Grades 8 to 12 (inclusive)

In the meantime...

students with 1995/96 GoCards who are still attending secondary schools can use them until October 31, 1996. If a GoCard has been lost over the summer it should be replaced immediately by calling your school.

New Grade 8 students can pay a Concession fare without a GoCard until October 31, 1996. These students should inform the driver of their age, grade and school when boarding. If they encounter any problem, they are advised to pay the adult fare

and note the time of travel and the bus number, and call BC Transit Customer Relations at 540-3040.

If you miss the school photo session...

you will pay a \$5 fee to have a GoCard produced*. You may go to Photo Ident, 5317 Lane Street, Burnaby, (near Royal Oak SkyTrain Station) Phone 434-1321, or to Mountain West Studios, 1073 Roosevelt Crescent, North Vancouver, Phone 980-8551. Appointments are recommended. Photo Ident's hours (year round) are 1:30 pm to 4:30 pm, Monday and Friday, and 9:00 am to 1 pm on Wednesday. Mountain West Studios' hours are 8:30 am to 4:30 pm, Monday to Friday. GoCard photography sessions will also be provided by Apple Photographic Services from October 26 to December 10 in a mobile unit that travels to locations throughout Greater Vancouver. Watch for details of dates and places.

• Students going to Photo Ident, Mountain West Studios or Apple Photographic Services must have a GoCard application form (available at the school office) signed by a school official, proof of age (birth certificate or passport) and a \$5 fee. A GoCard will be issued immediately.
