Spring Service Changes EFFECTIVE APRIL 12

TransLink

Greater local control the aim of ownership switch

April 1 marks a big day for the transit system in the Greater Vancouver region.

That's the day TransLink (formerly the Greater Vancouver Transportation Authority) officially takes responsibility for meeting the public's needs.

In an agreement confirmed by legislation last summer, the Province of B.C. has transferred control of BC Transit, WCE, SkyTrain, SeaBus, handyDART and some major roads and bridges in the Greater Vancouver Regional District to TransLink. TransLink gets some revenue directly from the Province, some from gas taxes and other levies. TransLink is governed by a board of 15 directors, including 12 mayors or GVRD directors and three provincial cabinet ministers or members of the Legislative Assembly.

Coast Mountain BusLink

is the newly named bus operating subsidiary of TransLink, which will encompass all bus, trolley bus and SeaBus services in the Greater Vancouver region (excluding the West Vancouver "Blue Bus" system). The name was selected by the TransLink

9 Boundary/Alma/UBC

In spring and summer all trips will terminate at Alma. Customers wishing to continue to UBC should transfer to a #10 or to B-Line at Alma & 10th Avenue.

25 Brentwood/UBC

While UBC is not in session, morning peak period service will be slightly reduced.

28 Capilano College/Phibbs Exchange/ Joyce Station &

Buses will follow a new direct route via Vanness to/from Joyce Station. **To Joyce Station** via Smith, Moscrop, Boundary and Vanness. **From Joyce Station** via Vanness, Boundary, Burke and Smith. Reduced summer service from Phibbs Exchange to Capilano College: The 9:32 and 9:47 trips will not be extended. Transfer to the #239.

44 UBC/Downtown

Until September, service will operate every 30 minutes. (Every 15 minutes to UBC between 8:00 and 8:30 am).

49 Metrotown Station/Dunbar Loop &

Until September, all peak-period trips will terminate at Dunbar Loop.

99 B-Line

Until September, Monday to Friday westbound morning peak service will operate every 7-8 minutes from Broadway Station to UBC.

Burnaby, New Westminster, Coquitlam, Port Coquitlam & Port Moody

102 Fraserview/New Westminster Station 103 Quayside

108 Eighth Ave/New Westminster Station

These routes are not presently providing wheelchair accessible service.

133 SFU/Metrotown Station

Seasonal service will operate every 60 minutes. For the summer, the 8:10 and 9:10 am trips from Metrotown will be discontinued. From SFU, the 1:26, 2:56 and 3:56 trips will be discontinued.

135 SFU/Stanley Park

During SFU's summer semester, peak-period service will be slightly reduced. A.M. trips will leave Hastings at Kootenay for SFU at 7:55, 8:50, 9:03 and 9:46. P.M. trips will leave SFU at 4:35, 6:30 and 7:30.

142 SFU/Edmonds Station

Service will be discontinued until September.

143 SFU/Coquitlam Station

During SFU's summer semester, service after 8:30 am will operate every 60 minutes. (The 9:05 am trip from Coquitlam Station will be discontinued).

Spring Service changes

EFFECTIVE APRIL12

148 loco/New Westminster Station

From May 15 to September 6, several weekend and holiday trips will be extended to White Pine Beach. Watch for weekday service to White Pine Beach starting June 12.

190 Coquitlam Station/Vancouver

This route will no longer operate between Coquitlam Station and Port Coquitlam Station. Customers should transfer to the #160 or #161 to complete their trip to Port Coquitlam.

Surrey, Delta & White Rock

145 Scott Road Stn/Lougheed Mall/SFU &

There will be seasonal trip reductions on the part of the route between Scott Road Stn, Lougheed Mall and SFU.

320 Langley Centre/Fleetwood/ Surrey Central Station

The schedule will be revised. Trips will leave Fleetwood for Surrey Central Station at 8:07, 8:41, 9:13 and 9:43 am. (The 9:20 am trip will be discontinued).

321 White Rock South/Newton Exchange/ Surrey Central Station 330 Surrey Central Stn/Scott Road Stn

The #321 Sunday/holiday early morning trip between Surrey Central Station and New Westminster Station will now operate as a #330.

390 Surrey Central Stn/White Rock South 394 King George Stn/White Rock Centre

New! To provide customers with more convenient stops on King George Highway, these buses will now stop for southbound pick up and northbound drop off in front of the Revenue Canada Taxation Centre and at 96 Avenue for Surrey Memorial Hospital.

Richmond, South Delta

404 Ladner Exchange/Tsawwassen Ferry

The seasonal extended trips to the Tsawwassen Ferry will not operate as #404s. Extra buses will, however, provide service between Ladner Exchange and the ferry terminal to meet customer demand.

410 22nd Street Station/Queensborough/ Richmond Exchange

15 minute service will begin earlier during Monday to Friday peak hours.

480 Steveston/UBC

New! As a pilot service, the #480 route will provide limited service this summer. One trip will operate from Richmond to UBC (arriving at 8:11 am), and one from UBC (leaving at 4:40 pm).

Tsawwassen Ferry

Additional service will be provided at busy times through the spring and summer.

Board of Directors from some 400 names proposed by transit employees and over 2,100 public entries. The employee and public entries were reviewed by a seven-member volunteer panel which submitted a short list to the TransLink Board for final selection.

"The Board - and the panel before it - had to consider several factors in selecting a name," said TransLink chair, George Puil. Not only does it have to describe the service, it needs to provide a geographic context. Furthermore, the name must work well as a corporate identity and offer market branding opportunities as well. We're satisfied that the new name does all that, and we would like to thank everyone who proposed a name and the panel for assessing the hundreds of submissions."

The volunteer panel was comprised of three transit employees, two representatives of transportation/environmental advocacy groups and two representatives of news organizations.
