For instance, from 1990 to 1994 Tom was senior vice-president of subways with New York's Metropolitan Transit Authority, overseeing the famous New York City subway system.


He's also been president of the Long Island Rail Road, the largest commuter railroad in the U.S, and

#### **BACK ISSUES**

**Back Issues** is a new section that mines past issues of The Buzzer for nuggets of transit history. Huzzah!

**1966** The *Buzzer* wasn't solely just a Metro Vancouver newsletter: Victoria once had its own edition, too. On July 18, 1966, however, B.C. Hydro published its last Victoria Buzzer after over fifty years of weekly editions. The reasons why was unclear: while the last issue rehashed old jokes and moments in Victoria transit history, it made no mention of why the Buzzer was ending its run.

Anita Wasiuta, Marketing and Communications Manager for B.C. Transit in Victoria, said she understood that the Buzzer stopped in 1966 due to a lack of staff resources and the rising cost of publishing. But, she added, the Buzzer was resurrected in the mid-80s by B.C. Transit, and published monthly

by B.C. Transit, and published monthly for eight or nine years before being discontinued again. Cost was again a factor, but so was one other thing.

"It was the advent of the web. We were able to put a lot of info on the website that we put in the Buzzer, so there was just no need for it."

And so ended its run. Farewell, Victoria Buzzer!

## Ride transit to the HSBC Celebration of Light!

We've scheduled extra service to help you get to and from the HSBC Celebration of Light fireworks festival on July 23 (Canada), July 26 (U.S.A.), July 30 (China), and August 2 (finale). Read on to find out just how you can get to the festival and back on transit, and service issues you should know about for those nights!

**SKYTRAIN** 



SkyTrain will provide frequent service on all event nights. Travel earlier if possible, as trains are expected to be especially busy between 8 p.m. and 9:30 p.m.

GETTING THERE Passengers may transfer at Granville Station to the #5 Robson or the #6 Davie bus (board these buses on Richards Street), or walk to English Bay from Burrard Station.

AFTER THE FIREWORKS The last train is scheduled to depart Waterfront Station at its regular time of 1:16 a.m. (Service will be extended if necessary to clear any remaining passengers, but passengers <u>must</u> be at the station before closing time.)

On Celebration of Light nights, the following SkyTrain rules/ procedures are in effect:

**BIKES ON SKYTRAIN** Delays and restrictions are in effect in the afternoon/evening when trains are crowded. Wheelchairs and strollers have priority boarding. No bicycles can board after 10 p.m. until crowds have cleared. Cyclists should expect delays of up to 90 minutes.

WATERFRONT STATION Access the station from Howe Street only. There will be no access to SkyTrain through the CP Station on Cordova Street except for disabled passengers needing elevator service to the platform. As well, all SkyTrain passengers must leave the train at Waterfront Station—no reverse riding is allowed. Passengers arriving by SeaBus must also leave Waterfront Station. Passengers should then join the lineup to access the SkyTrain from Howe Street.

**BURRARD STATION The westbound platform will be closed.** Customers will be asked to line up as directed by SkyTrain staff.

GRANVILLE STATION The Seymour Street and Granville Mall entrances will close after 10 p.m. All passengers must enter from Dunsmuir Street. An elevator is available for disabled passengers and those travelling with strollers. Bikes will be accommodated after crowds on trains have cleared. The westbound direction platform at Granville Station will also be closed.

### BUS

GETTING THERE Starting at 6 p.m., there will be more buses to the downtown area, plus the **#5 Robson** and the **#6 Davie** southbound on Richards Street will run more frequently.

After 7:30 p.m., **#5 Robson** buses will terminate at Robson and Denman, return to downtown via Denman, then travel eastbound on Georgia. As well, **#6 Davie** buses will turn south onto Thurlow, and terminate near the Vancouver Aquatic Centre at Pacific Avenue.

After 9 p.m., **#22 Macdonald/Knight** will use Granville Bridge and 4th Ave., with no service on Cornwall Ave. during that time.

AFTER THE FIREWORKS Extra buses will be in service to transport customers out of downtown, and there will be buses waiting to meet the last SkyTrain at key major-route locations.

CANADA LINE CONSTRUCTION BUS REROUTING Due to Canada Line construction on Granville Mall, the **#5 Robson** and **#6 Davie** routes travel south (towards the West End) on Richards and return along Seymour. Check bus stop signs—not all routes stop at every location.

**COMMUNITY SHUTTLE REROUTING** The **C21 Beach** and **C23 Davie** be rerouted 7:30 p.m. to 11 p.m. The C21 will take its regular route to Beach & Hornby, then reroute via Hornby and Davie, then go back to its regular route. The C23 will do its regular route to Davie & Thurlow, reroute via Thurlow and Pacific, then go back to its normal route.

#### WEST VANCOUVER BLUE BUS

Extra bus trips from West Vancouver via Park Royal will be added on event nights.

GETTING THERE More trips downtown will start at 6:30p.m.

AFTER THE FIREWORKS Blue Buses will provide return trips from Georgia Street at Denman Street.

# West Coast Express will run regular

West Coast Express will run regular service on Celebration of Light event days, plus A SPECIAL FINALE NIGHT TRAIN on August 2. The special will leave Mission Station at 7 p.m. and arrive at Waterfront Station at 8:13 p.m. The return trip leaves Waterfront at midnight.

FARES All valid weekly and 28-day passes will be honoured.


## **SEABUS**

- JULY 23 15-min service until 11:30 p.m., then every 30 min. Final sailing from Waterfront: 1:22 a.m.
- JULY 26 From Lonsdale Quay: service every 15 minutes until 12:30 a.m., with final sailing at 1 a.m. From Waterfront: service every 15 minutes until 12:16 a.m., plus sailings at 12:46 a.m. and 1:22 a.m.
- JULY 27 Sailings every 15 minutes to 9:16 p.m., then every 30 minutes. Final sailing from Waterfront: 11:16 p.m.
- JULY 3015-min service until 11:30 p.m., then every 30 min.Final sailing from Waterfront: 1:22 a.m.
- AUG 2 15-min service until 11:30 p.m., then every 30 min. Final sailing from Waterfront: 1:22 a.m.
