

Can you believe it? It's been 70 years since the first electric trolleybuses burst onto the scene, forever changing the way we move around in the city.

The first trolleybuses, the Canadian Car Brill T-44, hit the road on August 16, 1948, operating the 6 Fraser and 15 Cambie routes.

The trolleybus's arrival was part of the ambitious "rails-to-rubber" conversion to decommission the streetcar network and replace it

The last streetcar route departed Vancouver's streets in 1955. Diesel buses soon joined the fleet, and later came compressed natural gas and diesel-electric hybrid buses.
